Methodist Church Statement following the recent Supreme Court judgement regarding gender.

### Statement

Following the Supreme Court's judgment, many may feel anxious, hurt, or unsettled. We need to be clear: nothing in this ruling diminishes our determination to be an inclusive church. The Methodist Church believes that all people, regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity, have a place in God's Church and trans people should always feel that they are welcome and loved.

It is important that we reassert this in the light of some of the coverage of the Supreme Court's ruling; this is not a matter of 'winners' or 'losers', and to portray it as such is at best unhelpful and at worst an attempt to justify prejudice and discrimination. The Court made its ruling on a matter of the interpretation of the law. It determined what the provisions of The Equalities Act mean by defining who may or may not participate in some single-sex activities or may use certain single-sex facilities, and who is and is not protected against discrimination on the grounds of sex (whilst noting that trans people are protected against discrimination because they are trans – and that has not changed).

Although the ruling is likely to present an issue in only a few places, the effect on those who feel excluded and uncertain is wider and deeper. Anyone in that position, and wanting pastoral support should contact the local minister or superintendent, District EDI Officer or Connexional Inclusion Team.

## Some Unusual Lenten Symbols

Visitors to the worship area at Trinity during Lent this year may well have been puzzled by the symbols adorning the Lent cross. In a departure from usual practice the items added week by week to form our Lenten tableau were inspired by the *Soul Food* resources produced by the Methodist Church: an initiative designed to provide “*spiritual nourishment for Lent and beyond*”. Each Sunday's theme was closely linked to the appointed Psalm and Gospel and was illustrated by use of an appropriate object. Week by week these objects were placed on the cross as part of the opening liturgy.

- **Lent 1: Soul Food:** all the things that nourish us. **(A brown paper food bag).**
- **Lent 2: Soul Shelter:** nourished by a safe home for everyone. **(An umbrella).**
- **Lent 3: Soul Rest:** nourished by patience and slowness. **(A pillow)**
- **Lent 4 (Mothering Sunday):** Soul Repair: nourished by unconditional love and forgiveness. **(A piece of fabric with a sewn-up hole).**
- **Lent 5: Soul Mates:** nourished by companionship. **(A friendship bracelet).**
- **Palm Sunday:** Soul Songs: nourished by music from the heart. **(A vinyl record).**
- **Easter Day:** Soul Stories: so well nourished that we have to share it. **(An open story book).**



The opening liturgy provided for Easter Day made this joyful affirmation:

- Alleluia! Alleluia! This Is our story and our song....
- O Lord our God, our Lenten journey has ended, our Easter journey begun. Nourished by our journey, let us share and tell your living, loving stories.
- ***Alleluia! Alleluia! Christ is risen! Alleluia!***

## Tissington

A recent holiday in South Derbyshire took us to the beautiful village of Tissington near Ashbourne -

‘One of the prettiest villages in this part of the Peaks..’

The week before, Derek had taken part in the funeral of Kate Dack. It took place in Tissington Parish Church where she had grown up and where some of the family still live. Kate was laid to rest in the churchyard along with the ashes of husband Mike and we were able to visit the grave and see her flowers still remarkably fresh in the Spring sunshine.

We walked around the village and came across the Methodist Chapel some way from the village centre. The Chapel was open and we spent time quietly in this cool restful place. We spotted this information about the Chapel which made us smile:

‘The Primitive Methodist Church in Tissington was built in 1866 on a gift of land from Mr George Johnson, not on the estate land which belonged to the FitzHerberts, who would not allow a Methodist Church to be built on their land. The original building was made of wood with a corrugated iron roof and was erected by the local blacksmith and his six sons, the Wright family. As the years went by, the building became more unstable and one local preacher recorded how the whole structure shook when a cow in the field outside rubbed itself on the corner of the building.

The present Chapel was built in 1901 and recently renovated.

We signed the visitors book, passed on greetings from Oadby Trinity and picked up the following prayer card which we share with you;

‘As the quietness of this place surrounds you, so may God’s peace

envelop your being. As the fields and hills nurture such life, so may you be sustained by God's love. Do not leave this place unchanged. Give your sadnesses and losses to God, and take hope and love with you. As you journey out, know that you have been in God's presence. And may he who announces himself through the beauty around you Hold you to him always. Amen'

## ..... And a very Joyful Easter Sunday

On Easter Sunday 2025, the joy and excitement at Oadby Trinity Methodist Church was palpable, and no-one was more excited than Rev Derek! For on Easter Sunday we had our very first adult baptism by immersion at Trinity. We do not have an in-built baptismal pool, so we borrowed a pool from St Paul's Church and the heater and the pump from the Baptist Church. The pool was a "birthing pool"; very apt as baptism is about new birth and new life in Christ. So it was very significant that this special event was to happen on Easter Day, when Jesus' resurrection from the grave brought us all the promise of new life in him.

We were celebrating the resurrection of our Lord Jesus from the dead and we were witnessing the baptism of a new member of our Church who had come to faith in Christ since joining our congregation late in 2024. We shared in the Lord's Supper together and sang wonderful uplifting Easter hymns; - Christ the Lord is risen today", "See what a morning!" and "Thine be the glory". It really was the most joyful Easter Sunday service, and it is an occasion which continues to bring joy and happiness as people recall and talk about the events of that day.

## **Hijab Butch Blues – A Memoir by Lamya H.**

This is an autobiographical account about the experience of never quite belonging. Born in one country, brought up in a second, and living in a third (the US), nowhere is home. It is also a journey of self-discovery of what it means to be Muslim, to be Queer, and how to navigate the compatibility of those aspects of identity, in the face of a lived experience of Racism, Homophobia, and Islamophobia.

Each chapter is interspersed with a reflection about one of the major characters in the Quran. As Christians, these stories are almost – but not quite – familiar. In each of them, we will see two levels of unfamiliarity: first, the story in the Quran differs from the one in the Jewish/ Christian Bible, and second, the way in which the story is reimagined.

In Islam, it is Ishmael that Ibrahim is called to sacrifice, but the story of Hajar (Hagar) is otherwise familiar to Christians. Lamya H. recognises Hajar as a victim of an abusive relationship, someone who had no power to deny consent to impregnation by Ibrahim, loved by God/Allah as she is cast out, and a horrified bystander as Ibrahim seeks to slaughter her son. Modern Christian theology would support this re-reading, but it far from mainstream in Christianity or Islam.

Fewer of us will be familiar with the story of Asiyah, the abused wife of a Pharaoh who is held up as a model of feminine patience and forbearance, and a model under which Muslim women are obliged to stay in marriages however violent and oppressive. Lamya H. reimagines a new ending in which Asiyah's breaks free of the marriage, then uses that interpretation to support those of her friends and relations fleeing husbands who violently exploit this dutiful submissiveness.



Ultimately, she finds acceptance in a new community which represents “family”, and she also addresses the internalised phobias of a traumatic life journey. Whilst the book ends in a positive place, I cannot escape feeling fearful of the fragility of Lamya’s life today: having no roots anywhere else, yet living in the US where Queer, Asian, and Muslim people are demonised, and rights of residency increasingly imperilled.

The book is an easy read, but deeply theological.

### **We Are Not Numbers: The Voices of Gaza’s Youth by Ahmed Al-naouq and Pam Bailey**

Ahmed Alnaouq has spoken at Trinity as part of the Amos Trust tours. One of the strengths of Amos’ work, is the way in which they inspire hope even in the face of desolate situations. The work of ‘We Are Not Numbers’ is one of those glimmers of hope.

This project enables young adults in Gaza to write short pieces about their lives. The book is a collection of these stories.

The selection is surprisingly varied: it is about normal life, hopes, and dreams for the future. Of aspirations for study, for work, and for family. However, each of the stories is inevitably set in the context of the restrictions that exist in Gaza. The stories are grouped by year from 2015, with the final chapter covering the period since October 2023. Each story is accompanied by a footnote telling us the whereabouts of the author at the date of publication.

For many people, the situation in Gaza divides neatly into the period before and after the Hamas atrocities of 7<sup>th</sup> October, but in these stories the divide is much less stark: conditions in Gaza were already dire long before that.

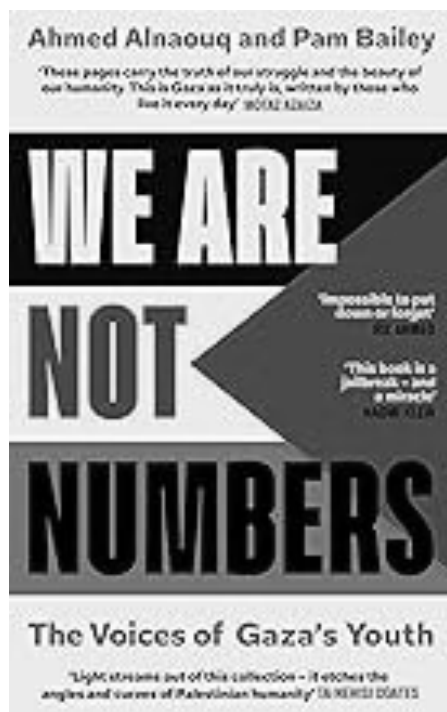

## BIBLE MONTH 2025: GOSPEL OF JOHN

Bible Month is an annual initiative promoted jointly by The Methodist Church and Leaders of Worship and Preachers Trust (LWPT). Many churches choose to use these resources during June, but at Trinity this year we have decided that it will be more appropriate to celebrate Bible Month on the **first four Sundays in August**. (On the fifth Sunday in August there will be a Circuit Welcome Service at Wigston Magna).

The book chosen for Bible Month this year is **St John's Gospel**. In his introduction to the *Study Guide*, Professor David Ford describes the Fourth Gospel as *"the Gospel of Superabundance... Jesus is full of grace and truth, and from his abundance, we have all received grace"*. The four services will cover the following themes:

Aug 3: *Embracing God and all reality* (John 1)

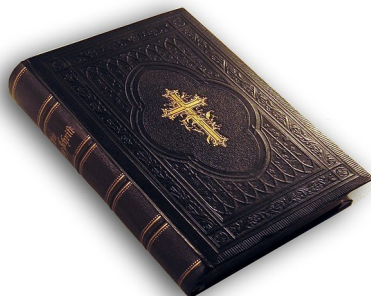
Aug 10: *Signs, conversations & controversy* (John 2-12)

Aug 17: *Jesus' discipleship course* (John 12-17)

Aug 24: *'The hour' and the resurrection* (John 18-21).

Look out for free copies of the **30-Day Reading Guide**: this is designed to help us read through each chapter of John's Gospel and to *"deepen our understanding of Jesus' purpose and the divine abundance he offers"*.
